The above picture is a Fire Tower that used to be located on top of Cherry Mt. It was built and used from 1939 until 1968, and was taken down in 1989. There were a known 91 towers throughout the state with 17 still active. The Cherry Mt. Tower stood 3,573 ft. above sea level and the tower itself was 40 ft. high. These were run by the White Mt. National Forest and the only way they had for many years to watch for fires. After they were closed, Joe O'Brien would fly his plane out of the Twin Mt. Airport and watch for any signs of fires.

Tomato Basil Bruschetta

10 Roma Tomatoes, diced small

1/2 Red Onion, diced small

1/3 cup fresh basil, minced

3 garlic cloves, minced

3 Tbsp. Lemon Juice

2 Tbsp. Red wine vinegar

3 Tbsp. extra virgin olive oil

Salt and pepper to taste

Optional: I add 1 tsp sugar to above mixture as I like it sweeter.

Mix together and let set in refrigerator for at least an hour. Cut baguette bread into slices and brush with olive oil. Grill slices. Spoon tomato mixture onto grilled baguette slices, enjoy!

Historical Society Looking for Town of Carroll Annual Reports

The Twin Mountain-Bretton Woods Historical Society recently learned that Town of Carroll annual reports for about 70 years are available online in digital format.

The University of New Hampshire Library maintains a collection of digitized New Hampshire Cities and Towns documents. Digitized Town of Carroll annual reports (spanning from 1898 to 2003) can be viewed at https://www.library.unh.edu/search/digital/%2A%3A%2A?f%5B0%5D=category%3ANH%20Cities%20%26%20Town s/Carroll%2A. However, the UNH collection is not complete.

Historical Society member Mike Gooden searched the archives and his own personal collection, and located paper copies for all but 8 reports missing from the UNH collection. Those annual reports missing include 1897, 1900, 1902, 1905, 1907, 1913, 1914, and 1917.

Building Committee June 2019 Update

Since the April 2019 Building Committee update for the newsletter, the Building Project has been actively progressing. The multi-phase project of which Phase 1 (approval phase) is complete, is now well underway in Phase 2 (design and construction). The final phase will be the transition into the new buildings.

After a review of two proposals from civil engineering firms, the Select Board agreed to hire Northpoint Engineering, LLC of Concord to design the site including driveways, parking, storm drainage, utilities, septic systems, and the relocation of the School Street intersection with US Route 302. The town currently contracts with the firm for other engineering services. Northpoint Engineering, through its principal Jeff Lewis, will also be responsible for obtaining any required State approvals.

On May 9, the Committee together with Project Manager Allan Clark held interviews with four construction management firms that responded to the Request for Proposal to design and construct the project. The four firms were: Bonnette, Page & Stone of Laconia; Conneston Construction, Inc. of Gilford; Ricci Construction Co., Inc. of Portsmouth; and Daniel Hebert, Inc. of Colebrook. Following much deliberation, the Committee adopted a motion to recommend to the Select Board the selection of Ricci Construction Co., Inc. to be the construction management firm.

Later that evening, the Select Board by a unanimous vote accepted the Committee's recommendation and agreed to proceed with Ricci Construction Co. to design and construct the buildings. Ricci Construction's architect, John Tuttle, AIA, principal at T|W Designs, LLC will develop the conceptual building plans into working drawings.

A Task Force consisting of Select Board member David Scalley, Fire Chief Jeremy Oleson, Police Chief Tadd Bailey, Project Manager Clark and myself meet weekly with Ricci Construction Co., T|W Designs, and Northpoint Engineering to be certain that the town receives the best possible project.

The process has focused on converting the conceptual floor plans to actual working drawings and finalizing the footprints of the two buildings so that the site plan can be completed. The Public Safety Building will utilize the same footprint as the conceptual plan and the interior layout is essentially the same as the conceptual design. The Town Administrative Building essentially utilizes the same footprint as the conceptual plans, however the interior layout has undergone significant changes to better reflect the needs of the town and in particular the work flow and safety of those working in the building.

The Task Force has been actively working to make the site plan as efficient as possible recognizing the constraints of the topography, snowmobile trail, sledding hill and the existing Town Hall. It was quickly realized that the conceptual site plan that was utilized for budgeting and obtaining town approval was not going to be physically possible. Northpoint Engineering has developed over 12 conceptual site plans and continues to work to reach an acceptable layout of all of the site components. Fortunately, the relocation of School Street to intersect with US Route 302 opposite St. Patrick's Church Drive was met with enthusiasm by the New Hampshire Department of Transportation.

Project financing was finalized with a 21 year loan at a fixed rate of 2.99%, saving substantially from the assumption of 4% utilized in the Project Budget and the estimated tax rate impact. A \$250,000 detailed grant application was submitted last month to the Northern Border Regional Commission with the award not expected until September.

Other funding applications in progress include a grant from New Hampshire Homeland Security and Emergency Management and a rebate from Eversource for energy efficient buildings and fixtures.

It is anticipated that design and approvals could be complete in August, provided the site planning concept is finalized soon, with groundbreaking taking place immediately after required permits are in place.
